Brittanie Propes, Parks and Recreation Director, shared information regarding the no-mow zones. The PowerPoint presented is attached to the minutes.

#### 5. ACTION AGENDA

A. Platte Landing Park Playground & Trail Design

Brittanie Propes, Parks and Recreation Director, presented the proposed Platte Landing Park playground and trail design for consideration and recommendation to the Board of Aldermen for approval. She also summarized feedback received during the public input meeting held the previous week.

Discussion topics included the trail alignment alongside the baseball fields leading to the bridge with a request for cost comparisons between asphalt and concrete trail surfaces, flood resiliency of the proposed playground structure, potential future restroom facilities, and the overall size of the playground structure.

Brittanie noted that staff is currently preparing an application for a Platte County grant in the amount of \$80,000. She also stated that additional amenities are planned for the park as future grant funding is secured.

**ACTION:** Adam Zink moved that the Community Land and Recreation Board (CLARB) recommend that the Board of Aldermen approve the proposed playground concept and authorize the project to proceed into the design phase, including associated trail connection improvements. Evan Maxon seconded.

**RESULT:** Motion Passed: 6-0.

#### 6. STAFF UPDATES

**Train Depot Renovations**

The renovations to the Train Depot are nearing completion. The tenant plans to move into the depot by February 14, with a soft opening scheduled for January 31.

**Bridge to Platte Landing Park (PLP)**

Project Manager Chris Ashley provided an update on the Bridge to Platte Landing Park project. The anticipated completion date is mid-February. The bridge has been fabricated and will be delivered once site preparation is complete.

**Memorial Bench Program**

There are five new memorial benches available for donors currently on the waiting

list. All 5 benches will be installed at Platte Landing Park.

**Park Maintenance Facility Fence Extension**

A fence extension is planned for the south side of the park maintenance building. This project will help consolidate and organize materials in the area while providing cost savings. The trash dumpster currently located within English Landing Park will be relocated near the park maintenance building. The existing fence and mural surrounding the dumpster area in English Landing Park will remain in place.

**Wetlands**

Traps will be placed on four separate occasions to manage muskrat activity. The traps will be monitored daily, and a report will be provided on the number of animals captured. The same contractor will also conduct electrofishing to capture carp, which temporarily stuns the fish to allow for safe removal to a designated area.

**Wildflowers**

Additional wildflowers will be planted along Rush Creek expanding toward the A Truss Bridge.

**Scout Projects**

Two Eagle Scout projects are currently in the fundraising phase and are anticipated to begin in the spring/summer. Liaison Wassmer requested that Brittanie Propes share fundraising information to distribute as appropriate.

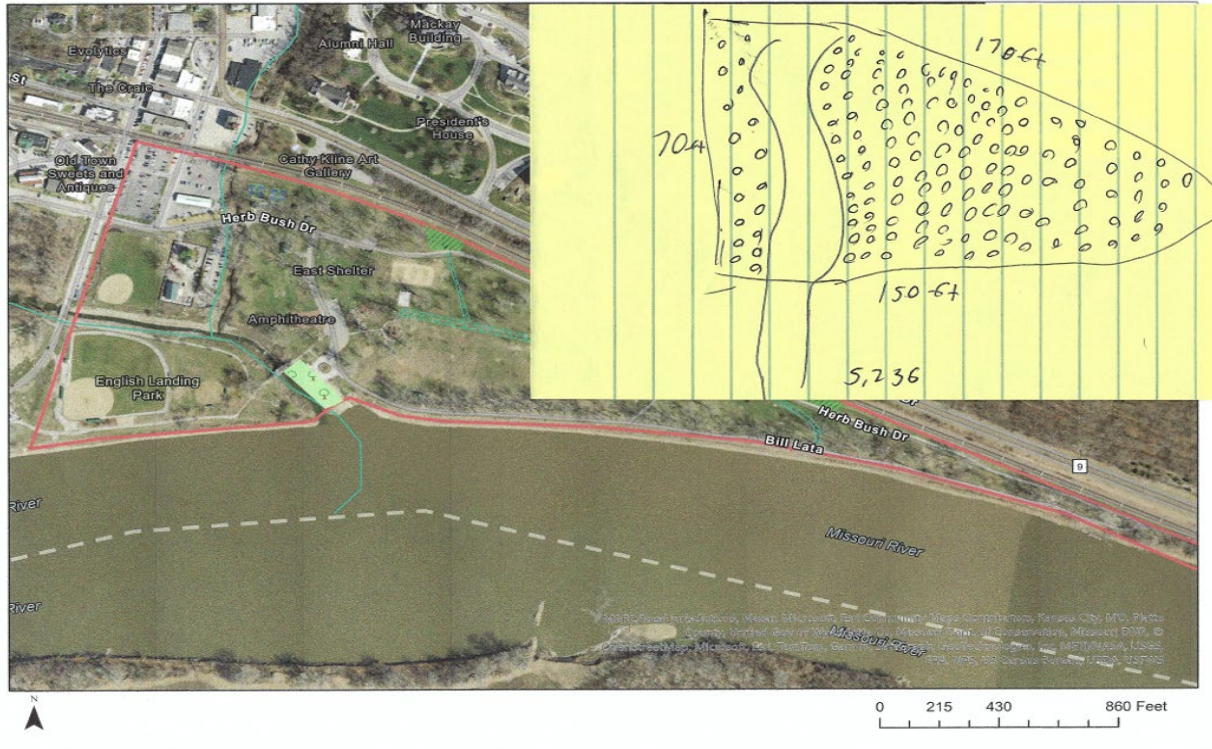

# 2025 No Mow Zone

Organization: MDC  
Year: 2024

## English Landing Park



### Location

The first No Mow Zone for 2025 is located in English Landing Park, on the north side of the trail near the first drainage culvert.

### Project Purpose

This No Mow Zone was established to support pollinators, improve native plant diversity, and create a sustainable naturalized area that reduces long-term mowing and maintenance needs.



### **Site Preparation**

Prior to planting, the site was fully prepared to support successful establishment. Preparation included:

- Mowing
- Power raking
- Tilling
- Removal of excess thatch



## Plant Installation

Following site preparation, staff installed **150 bare-root native plants** provided at no cost through the Missouri Department of Conservation Milkweed/Pollinator Program:

- 75 Swamp Milkweed (*Asclepias incarnata*)
- 75 Butterfly Weed (*Asclepias tuberosa*)

Plants were installed on approximately 5,236 square feet, spaced at roughly three-foot intervals.





### **Seeding Strategy**

After bare-root installation, the site was seeded with two native seed mixes from Missouri Wildflower Nursery:

- *Wet Soil Flower Mix*
- *Savanna Mix*

Both mixes were intentionally selected to ensure successful establishment under varying moisture conditions. This approach creates a robust seed bank capable of sustaining blooms during wet, dry, or mixed growing seasons.

Seeding rates were applied as follows:

- Wet Soil Flower Mix: applied at three times the recommended rate
- Savanna Mix: applied at one times the recommended rate



### Site Protection

The seeded area was covered with **99% weed-free EZ-Straw with tackifier** to protect seed during winter stratification and reduce erosion.

## Maintenance Approach

- The site will be regularly monitored for invasive species
- Invasive management will focus on hand removal only
- No herbicides or chemical treatments will be used

## Establishment Timeline

- **Year 1:** Seed stratification and early establishment
- **Year 2:** Site expected to be well established
- **Year 3:** Site expected to be fully established

ISSUE:

2026 Election of Board Officers

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Parkville Municipal Code Chapter 150, the Community Land and Recreation Board (CLARB) acts in an advisory capacity to study trees and shrubs along streets and in other public areas; review matters of park planning or other issues brought before the Board of Aldermen; and make recommendations regarding public neighborhood beautification project requests, event approvals occurring on community public right-of-way and park land, and procedures for carrying out such events. It consists of nine members who serve staggered, three-year terms.

According to the Community Land and Recreation Board Bylaws and Procedures adopted on October 12, 2005, the officers of the Community Land and Recreation Board shall consist of a Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary. The Community Land and Recreation Board shall annually elect these officers from its citizen members. Nominations shall be made from the floor, and the person receiving a majority vote of the total Board membership shall be declared elected. Officers shall serve until their successor is elected. No member may serve as Chairman for more than three consecutive elected one-year terms.

The Board members that currently hold the elected positions are Steven Sturgess as Chairman, Adam Zink as Vice Chairman, and Linda Arnold as Secretary

BUDGET IMPACT:

As this is an administrative item, there is no budget impact.

ALTERNATIVES:

1. Hold elections for the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary positions.
2. Postpone the elections.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Community Land and Recreation Board hold 2026 Board elections.

POLICY:

City Ordinance No. 2179 §1, 2-15-2005 states that the Community Land and Recreation Board shall choose its own officers.

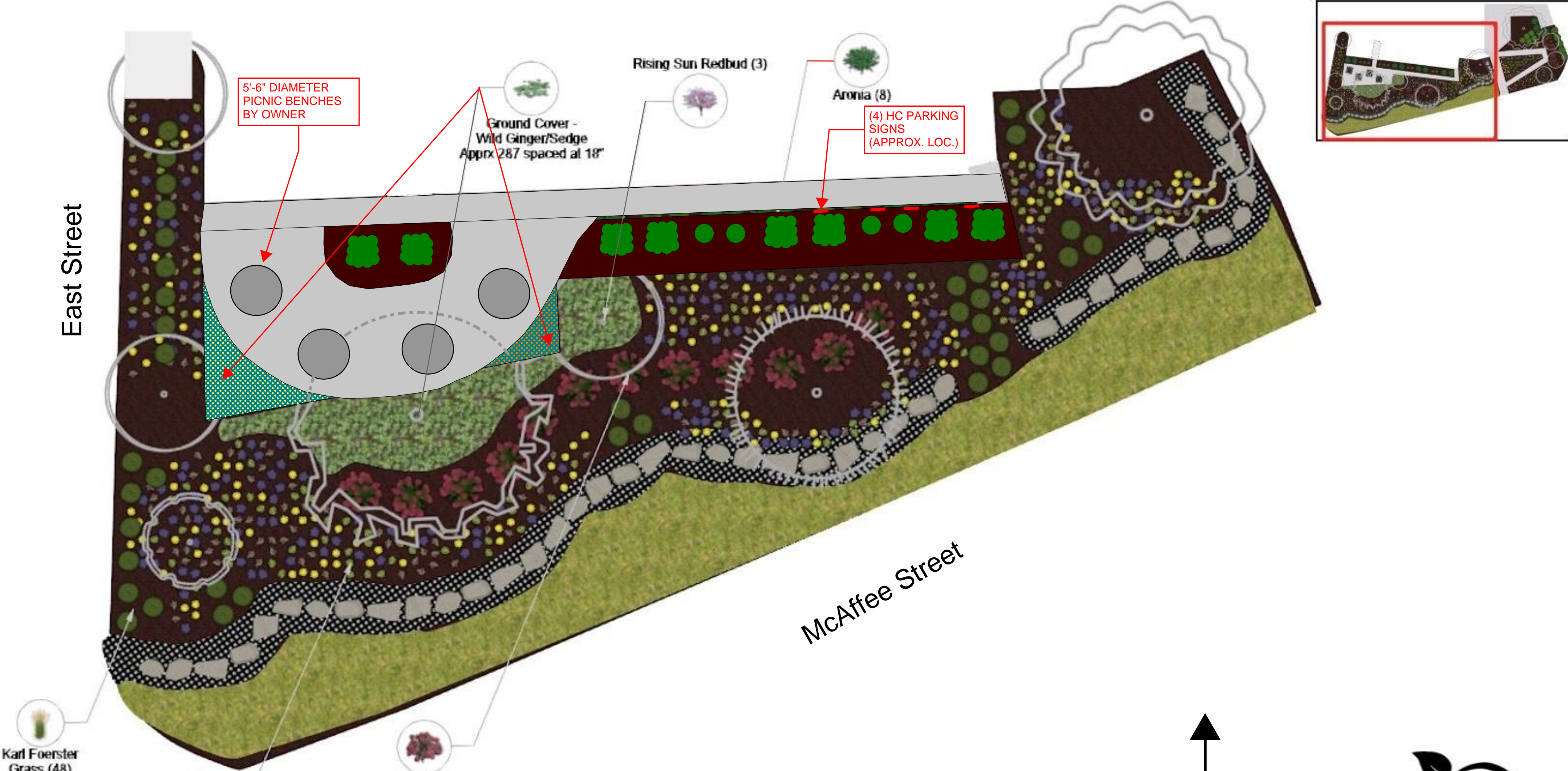

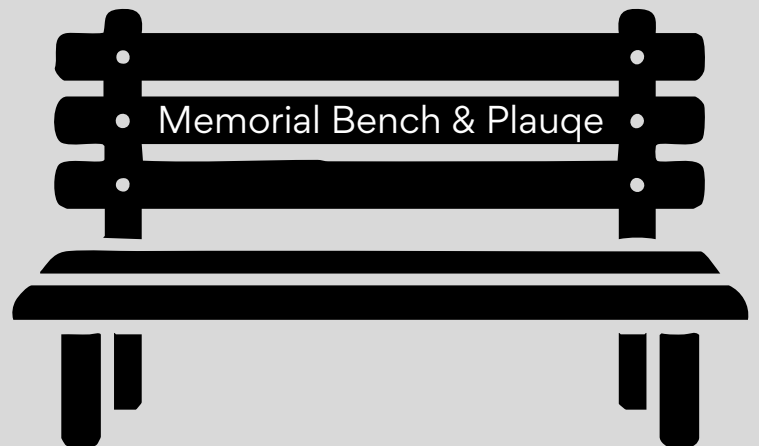

## Farmers Market

Current Updates:

Work on the West Parking Lot has been completed.

The contractor is completing the “punch list” items, including a fix for the loose, removable bollard covers at the entrances to the East lots, and rehangng the Jack Friedman memorial plaque.

The landscaping project south of the structure will occur this spring, as soon as the weather is favorable.

January 28, 2026, Parks Staff met with Ryan’s Lawn & Landscape to review their proposed landscape design for the area south of the Farmers Market structure and west of the handicap ramp. Parks Staff marked up Ryan’s document with questions and comments and are currently waiting to hear back.

The Jack Friedman commemorative plaque was installed on the west face of the SW column on February 6, 2026.

Parks Staff will be ordering 2-3 replacement timber wheel stops from the contractor.

**Gateway Park (9 HWY and NW 62nd Street)**

## Current Updates:

To comply with the City's Sign Ordinance, Park Staff is soliciting bids for a new stone monument base and perimeter landscaping to incorporate with the existing park identification sign. The location will remain the same.

**By the Blade was awarded the bid for the new monument sign. They will begin construction in early March 2026.**

## STATUS – IN PROGRESS

### **New Pedestrian Bridge and Vehicular Bridge Improvements at So. Main Street and Rush Creek**

The scope of this project is to remove the existing concrete traffic/pedestrian separation barrier, thus allowing for two-way traffic, and build a separate pedestrian foot-bridge to be located immediately to the east.

Staff is applying for an Outreach Grant from Platte County for this work. Submission deadline is January 19, 2024. Staff is also looking into other bridge improvement grant funding sources.

Staff has reached out to one of our On-Call structural engineers, Garver, to provide us with an assessment of the existing bridge. This assessment will include current condition, determining maximum allowable loads, and costs of the improvements.

Staff has submitted a grant application request in the amount of \$40,000, and will present our application in-person to Platte County on February 27, 2024.

Grant decision still pending.

Platte County has awarded the City its full grant request of \$40,000.

Staff is currently writing up a Request for Qualifications for engineering design work. It is anticipated that this RFQ will be issued by May 10th, 2024

Staff is in contact with on-call consultants to finalize the design scope of work

McClure Engineering has been contracted to design the vehicular and pedestrian bridge

Soil borings have been taken and are currently being analyzed by Kaw Valley Engineering for the foundations of the future pedestrian bridge

McClure is currently putting together a design schedule. It is anticipated that this project will go out to bid after the first of the year

Staff is working with McClure to determine exact location of the pedestrian bridge based on connectivity of the existing trails. Design work is continuing.

Staff is meeting with McClure on Monday, January 6, 2025 to review 90% complete construction documents.

It is anticipated that the project will go out to bid in mid-January 2025.

Staff is currently reviewing the final construction documents. It is anticipated that this project will go out to bid on the week of 2/24/25.

It is anticipated that this project will go out to bid the week of April 6, 2025.

Bids were received on May 28, 2025. Linaweaver Construction was the low bidder and awarded the project. We are currently finalizing their contract.

It is estimated that the project will be completed around the end of 2025.

Linaweaver Construction has been issued a Notice to Proceed with the project.

Shop drawings have been issued and reviewed by the Project Engineer and City Staff.

Fabrication of the new pedestrian bridge should begin this month. It is anticipated that it will arrive on site by the end of November.

The contractor has mobilized on-site and begun excavation for the two pedestrian bridge foundations. Pile driving will begin on Thursday, January 15, 2026.

Construction of the pedestrian bridge is scheduled to be completed by February 13, 2026. Modifications to the existing vehicular bridge will begin immediately after. That vehicular bridge work is anticipated to take approximately 2 weeks. The bridge will remain in service during construction.

**February 6, 2026 - The two concrete embankments have been poured and are currently curing.**

**The pedestrian bridge is now scheduled to be delivered on February 19, 2026, with project completion scheduled for March 9, 2026.**

**The City has hired McClure Engineering to do a structural assessment of the existing vehicular bridge to determine the maximum structural load capacity. This will then be posted on a permanent sign at the north entrance to the bridge.**

STATUS – IN PROGRESS

### **Girl Scout Shelter**

Current Updates:

Park Staff will be soliciting bids for flashing installation between the existing chimney and roof.

STATUS – IN PROGRESS

### **Veterans Memorial (Phase 2)**

Current Updates:

Fabrication of both the memorial and donor kiosks should begin this month and is anticipated to take about (3) months.

City Staff is working with the Veteran's Committee on planning out future phase work.

(2) kiosks and (3) military branch monuments have been ordered from Johnson Granite Supply. It is anticipated that fabrication and installation will take 3-4 months.

The Veteran's Committee has received a \$15,000 grant from the Downtown CID. This grant will be used for a monument sign to be located along the north side of the site. City Staff is assisting the Veteran's Committee with soliciting bids for this work.

STATUS – IN PROGRESS

### **Wetlands Educational Area**

Current Updates:

Signage locations for interpretive signs and directional signs have been verified.

Invasive Species removal is ongoing for invasive johnson grass, carp, and muskrat.

Park Staff is working with a graphic designer to create content for the remaining (7) educational signs. When completed, pedestal sign frames will be ordered and installed.

STATUS – IN PROGRESS

### **Platte Landing Park Inclusive Playground**

This project is a new inclusive playground identified in the 2025 Parks and Recreation Master Plan. The playground will be located at the site of the existing soccer practice fields (Friends Field), across S. Main Street from Friends' Shelter.

On January 9, 2026, City staff hosted a Community Engagement Meeting at the YMCA to gather additional community input for the playground concept. The presentation was led by Brent Magruder of Kompan, the playground designer and builder, along with Brittanie Propes. Community feedback was largely positive. Participants emphasized the importance of including ADA-accessible parking, a shade structure, trees to serve as a buffer, a water fountain, picnic seating, and historical signage, with the Steamboat Arabia cited as an example. Additional suggestions included considering a larger playground footprint and amenities designed for children with visual impairments. One resident raised concerns regarding the size of the parking lot and the use of concrete. The concrete parking lot was selected to meet ADA accessibility requirements.

Park Staff is waiting for the 2026 Platte County Partnership Grant program to open, to submit application for the cost of the playground structure and equipment. The City will pay for the cost of the adjoining parking lot and overall site improvements and will hire an engineer to design and provide budgetary costs for this work, so it can be put out to bid.

STATUS – IN PROGRESS

### **Trail Improvements from Downtown to New Platte Landing Park Inclusive Playground**

On January 16, 2026, Park staff submitted an application for an \$80,000 Platte County Outreach Grant to replace and extend a concrete trail from the entrance of English Landing Park to the new proposed inclusive playground in Platte Landing Park. Staff expects a decision to be made by the Outreach Grant Board sometime in the next 60 days.

STATUS – IN PROGRESS

### **English Landing Entrance Gates**

Parks Staff is currently studying entrance gate design options at the McAfee Street entrance to English Landing Park.
