3. ACTION AGENDA

- A. Approval of the Waddell Bridge lighting project

Alysen Abel, Public Works Director, gave a background of the Waddell Bridge that was moved to English Landing Park in 1987. The City applied for an Outreach Grant from Platte County Parks and Recreation for the installation of lighting on the bridge. The City received notice of award in March, 2020 for the grant in the amount of \$10,820. In September, staff received quotes with the low bid in the amount of \$13,420 from Outdoor Lighting Perspectives. The lights can be put on a timer and can also be color changing with an option for Bluetooth or Wi-Fi use. The Wi-Fi option would incur a monthly fee, to be determined. Staff recommends the Wi-Fi option and anticipates installation this fall.

LAURA OZENBERGER MOVED TO RECOMMEND THAT THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN APPROVE A CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT WITH OUTDOOR LIGHTING PERSPECTIVES FOR THE INSTALLATION OF THE LIGHTING ON THE WADELL BRIDGE WITH THE WIFI OPTION; BILL GRESHAM SECONDED; MOTION PASSED 8-0.

B. Approval of the Outreach Grant Application items

Alysen Abel, Public Works Director, gave a background of the approved 10-year, half-cent sales tax for parks, recreation, and storm water control. A portion of the sales tax proceeds are allocated for the Outreach Grant Program. During the September Community Land and Recreation Board meeting (CLARB) discussed priorities for the 2021 Parks Sales Tax, which include:

- Parks Department tractor - \$55,000
- Trail grading equipment - \$5,000
- English Landing Park playground upgrades - \$25,000
- Roundabout upgrade - \$30,000
- Park entryway signage - \$100,000
- Watkins Park - \$50,000
- Ballfields grading and improvements - \$150,000 - Staff has moved forward with the grading and will take the agreement, for approximately \$50,000, to the 10/20/20 Board of Aldermen meeting. With this coming in at a lower bid, Adams Park may be able to be added to the 2021 projects.

Staff recommends that the City submit an Outreach Grant application for one of the projects listed above.

Discussions were to keep the ballfields separate for a separate budgeted grant. CLARB members selected Watkins Park for the submission of the Outreach Grant application.

WILLIAM GRESHAM MOVED TO RECOMMEND THAT CITY STAFF PREPARE AN OUTREACH GRANT APPLICATION FOR THE WATKINS PARK PROJECT FOR \$50,000; ADAM ZINK SECONDED; MOTION PASSED 8-0.

- A. Dog park trash containers and a storage bin – Abel and Barnard said that the containers were removed last week by the contractor for the Wetlands; and the storage bin will be removed.
- B. Wetlands – inspection was done and there is an issue of the basins not holding water – The Corps of Engineer and the contractor are battling this out. Wetland signage possibly on hold.
- C. Bridge for the trail extension – Staff met with contractors on site. The contractor has not received a delivery date for the bridge. Due to the fires on the West coast, supply for wood is low, and it is anticipated that the installation will be in January, 2021. Staff was made aware that the fence is along the Magellan Gas Pipeline easement which the city will secure an agreement with one of the city’s on-call engineers to survey the area. Staff will update on the delivery date of the bridge.
- D. MOAW landscaping around their wells – staff has reached out and will follow up.

ISSUE:

Consider landscaping plans for Missouri American Water wells no. 4, 6, 7 and 8 in Platte Landing Park.

BACKGROUND:

On July 3, 2018 the Board of Aldermen passed Ordinance No. 2952 approving an Application for Conditional Use Permit for Missouri American Water Company to construct a new public utility water well no. 8 along the Missouri River, generally located in the southwest corner of Platte Landing Park, 300 South Main St. (Case No. PZ 2018-10; see Attachments 1 and 2).

One of the conditions of approval was for the existing vine vegetation screening on the security fences for utility water wells no. 4, 6 and 7 to be removed; for utility water wells no. 4, 6, 7 and 8 to be screened by a Type 1 landscaping buffer per Development Code, Section 407.030; and for the landscaping buffer to be trees with a variety of texture and color, specifically species suitable in a floodplain and complimentary to the plantings in the park and wetlands area.

Roger Sparks, Engineering Manager with Missouri American Water has submitted landscaping plans for utility water wells no. 4, 6, 7 and 8 in Platte Landing Park for staff review (see Attachment 3. Staff is presenting these plans before CLARB for input/feedback to determine whether or not the proposed plans fulfill the intended screening conditions of Ordinance No. 2952.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF PROFESSIONAL STAFF OR OTHER TECHNICAL REVIEWS:

Staff had previously reached out to Vireo, the City's on-call landscape architecture consultant to receive input on landscaping screening for Missouri American Water infrastructure in Platte Landing Park, specifically to reduce visual impact to the public. Laurie Brown, Conservation Ecologist with Vireo, recommended the following tree and shrub species could be used as a landscape buffer around the structure; and be complimentary to the plantings in the park and the wetlands area:

Trees:

- Bald Cypress – *Taxodium distichum* x 'Shawnee Brave'
- Regal Prince Oak – *Quercus x warei* 'Long' Regal Prince
- Hackberry – *Celtis occidentalis* x 'Prairie Sentinel'
- American Hornbeam – *Carpinus caroliniana* x 'Palisade'

Shrubs:

- Arrowwood Viburnum – Viburnum dentatum
- Blackhaw Viburnum – Viburnum prunifolium
- Black Chokeberry – Aronia melanocarpa
- Rough-leaved Dogwood – Cornus drumondii

BUDGET IMPACT:

With the exception of application and permit fees collected, there is no immediate budget impact.

ALTERNATIVES:

1. Approve the landscaping plans as presented.
2. Approve the landscaping plans, subject to changes as recommended by CLARB.
3. Deny the landscaping plans and provide alternative direction for staff.
4. Postpone the item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends CLARB review the proposed landscaping plans, and provide feedback to Missouri American Water and staff on whether or not the plans fulfill the screening conditions of Ordinance No. 2952, so that a proper motion can be taken (see suggested motion below).

POLICY:

Section 150.050.A. of the Parkville Municipal Code directs CLARB to act in an advisory capacity to the Board of Aldermen to develop and administer a written plan for the care, preservation, pruning, planting, replanting, removal, or disposition of trees and shrubs along streets and in other public areas. As CLARB serves in an advisory capacity, its recommendations must be approved by the Board of Aldermen.

SUGGESTED MOTION:

1. Approval – I move to approve the proposed landscaping plans for utility water wells no. 4, 6, 7 and 8 in Platte Landing Park as submitted by Missouri American Water Company.
2. Approval With Changes – I move to approve the proposed landscaping plans for utility water wells no. 4, 6, 7 and 8 in Platte Landing Park as submitted by Missouri American Water Company, subject to changes as recommended by CLARB.
3. Denial – I move to deny the proposed landscaping plans for utility water wells no. 4, 6, 7 and 8 in Platte Landing Park as submitted by Missouri American Water Company.
4. Postponement – I move to postpone the item to the next regular meeting of CLARB.

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT FOR MISSOURI AMERICAN WATER COMPANY TO CONSTRUCT A PUBLIC UTILITY WATER WELL ALONG THE MISSOURI RIVER, GENERALLY LOCATED IN THE SOUTHWEST CORNER OF PLATTE LANDING PARK AT 300 SOUTH MAIN STREET

WHEREAS, Missouri American Water Company submitted an Application for Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to construct a new Public Utility Water Well No. 8 along the Missouri River, generally located in the southwest corner of Platte Landing Park at 300 South Main St., Parkville, MO (Case No. PZ18-10); and

WHEREAS, in May 2008, Platte County purchased Platte Landing Park (132 acres, more or less) from the Kringle Family; and

WHEREAS, on May 18, 2005, Platte County entered into a cooperative agreement with Missouri American Water Company for easement access for recreational improvements upon Missouri American Water land located adjacent to Platte Landing Park, in exchange for easements within the park for future water well sites and access; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, the Parkville Board of Aldermen approved a conditional use permit and final development plans for the construction of a new drinking water treatment for Missouri American Water at 10550 NW FF Highway; and

WHEREAS, the new facility at 10550 NW FF Highway was needed to modernize and expand the area's drinking water operations and facilitate increased usage from area residents during peak hour demand; and

WHEREAS, in 2018, Missouri American Water Company determined that Utility Water Well No. 3 had reached the end of its lifespan and needed to be replaced or relocated; and

WHEREAS, Missouri American Water Company looked at several locations on their existing easements throughout Platte Landing Park and determined that the location in the southwest corner of the park was preferred due to the depth of bedrock and underground sand formations; and

WHEREAS, the preferred location conflicted with an existing multi-use trail and USA Track & Field certified 5k/10k course running along the perimeter of Platte Landing Park; and

WHEREAS, per City staff's request, Missouri American Water Company agreed to move their proposed location for Utility Water Well No. 3 approximately 100 feet to the south to avoid interference with the existing multi-use trail and USA Track & Field certified 5k/10k course; and

WHEREAS, Parkville Municipal Code Section 405.050 requires a CUP for public utilities or public service uses, buildings, structures, or appurtenances thereto in all zoning districts; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on June 12, 2018, at Parkville City Hall to consider the application, its merits, potential impacts, and impacts to the implementation of the *Parkville Master Plan* and *Park Master Plan 2016*; and

WHEREAS, following said public hearing, the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval of the Application for Conditional Use Permit (Case No. PZ18-10), subject to conditions, by a vote of 7-0; and

WHEREAS, on June 13, 2018, the Community Land and Recreation Board (CLARB) held a regular meeting to consider the application, its merits and potential impacts, and recommended unanimous approval of the Application for Conditional Use Permit (Case No. PZ18-10), subject to conditions, by a vote of 8-0 (1 recusal due to a conflict of interest); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen concurs with the conclusions of the Planning and Zoning Commission and CLARB and accepts their recommendation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF PARKVILLE, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

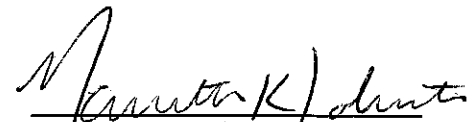
SECTION 1. The Application for Conditional Use Permit to construct a new Public Utility Water Well No. 8 along the Missouri River, generally located in the southwest corner of Platte Landing Park at 300 South Main Street (Case No. PZ18-10) is hereby approved, subject to conditions by the Board of Aldermen, including:

- Utility Water Well No. 8 be screened by a Type 1 landscaping buffer per Development Code, Section 407.030.
- Utility Water Well No. 7 (formerly well no. 5) be screened by a Type 1 landscaping buffer, per Development Code Section 407.030, and as required by Ordinance No. 2862.
- The length of the Conditional Use Permit be at least 20 years.
- The Parkville Public Works Department review the proposed easement area for the Missouri American Water Company's underground transmission line and engineering standards, specifically to ensure there are no right-of-way or erosion issues with the boat ramp driveway.
- The color of paint to be coated on Utility Water Well No. 8 be green or dark green to match the existing park pavilion color palette.
- The Type 1 landscaping buffer around Utility Water Well No. 8 be trees with a variety of texture and color, specifically species suitable in a floodplain and complimentary to the plantings in the park and wetlands area.
- The existing vine vegetation screening on the security fences for Utility Water Wells No. 4, 6 and 7 be removed, and that trees also be planted around those wells to serve as a landscaping buffer.
- Educational signage, related to the function of the wells and service provided to the community, be located near the wells to provide information to park patrons.
- The existing cul-de-sac and access off of South Main St., for decommissioned Utility Water Well No. 3, remain and not be removed by Missouri American Water Company.

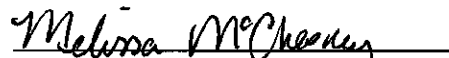
SECTION 2. The conditional use permit shall be effective from the effective date indefinitely.

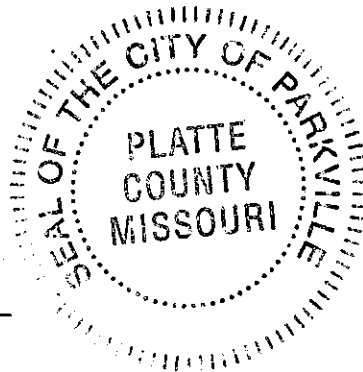
SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon its passage.

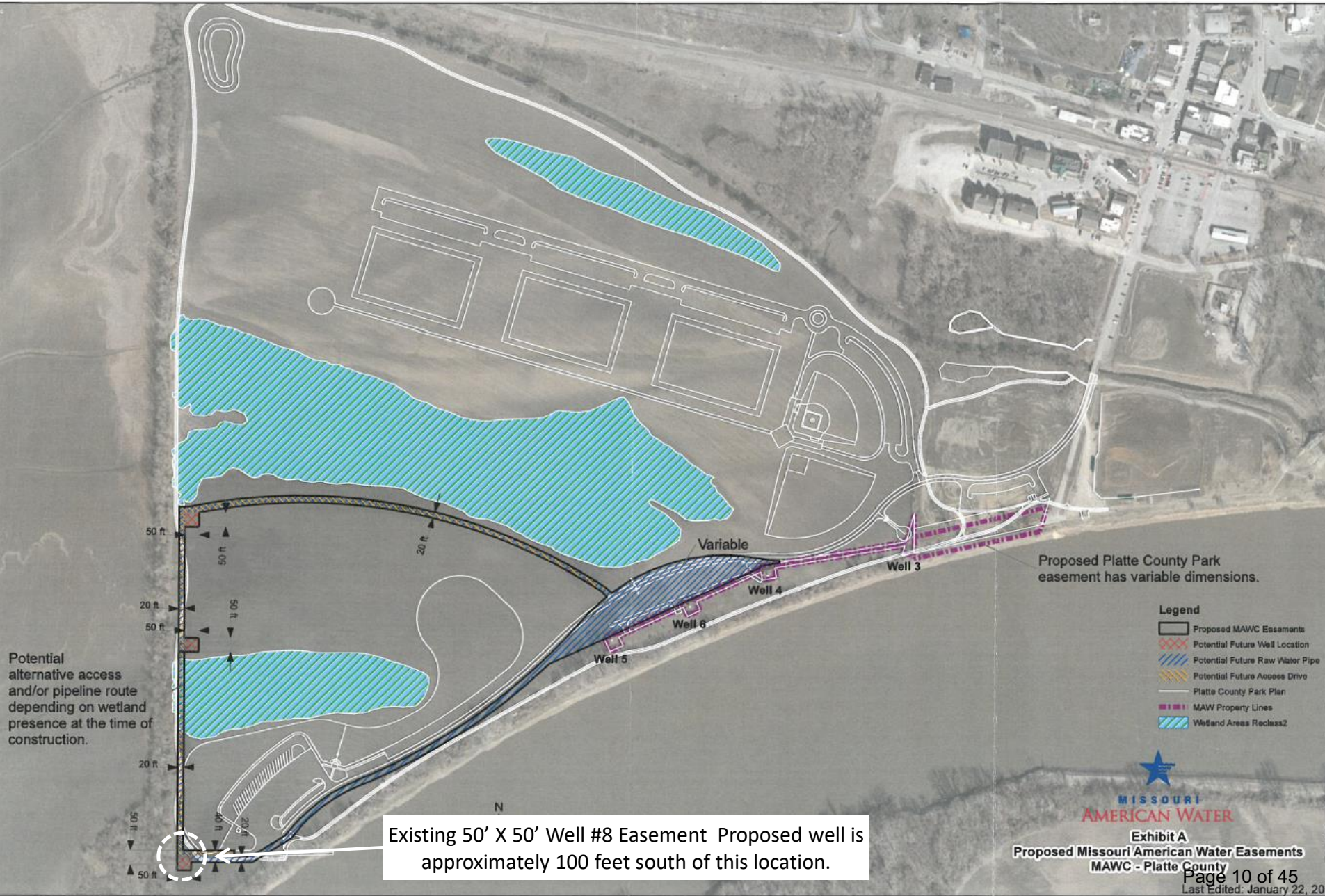

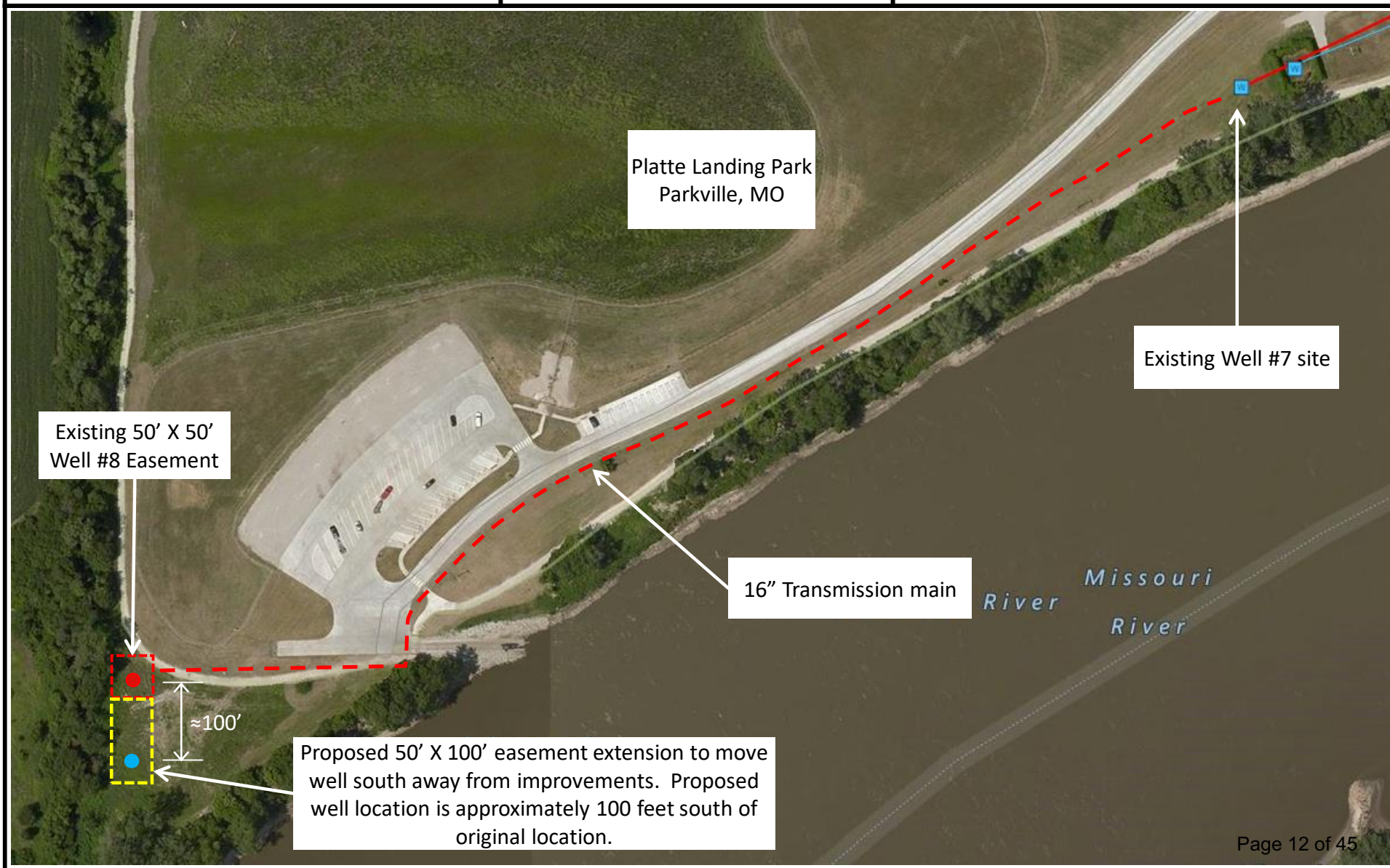

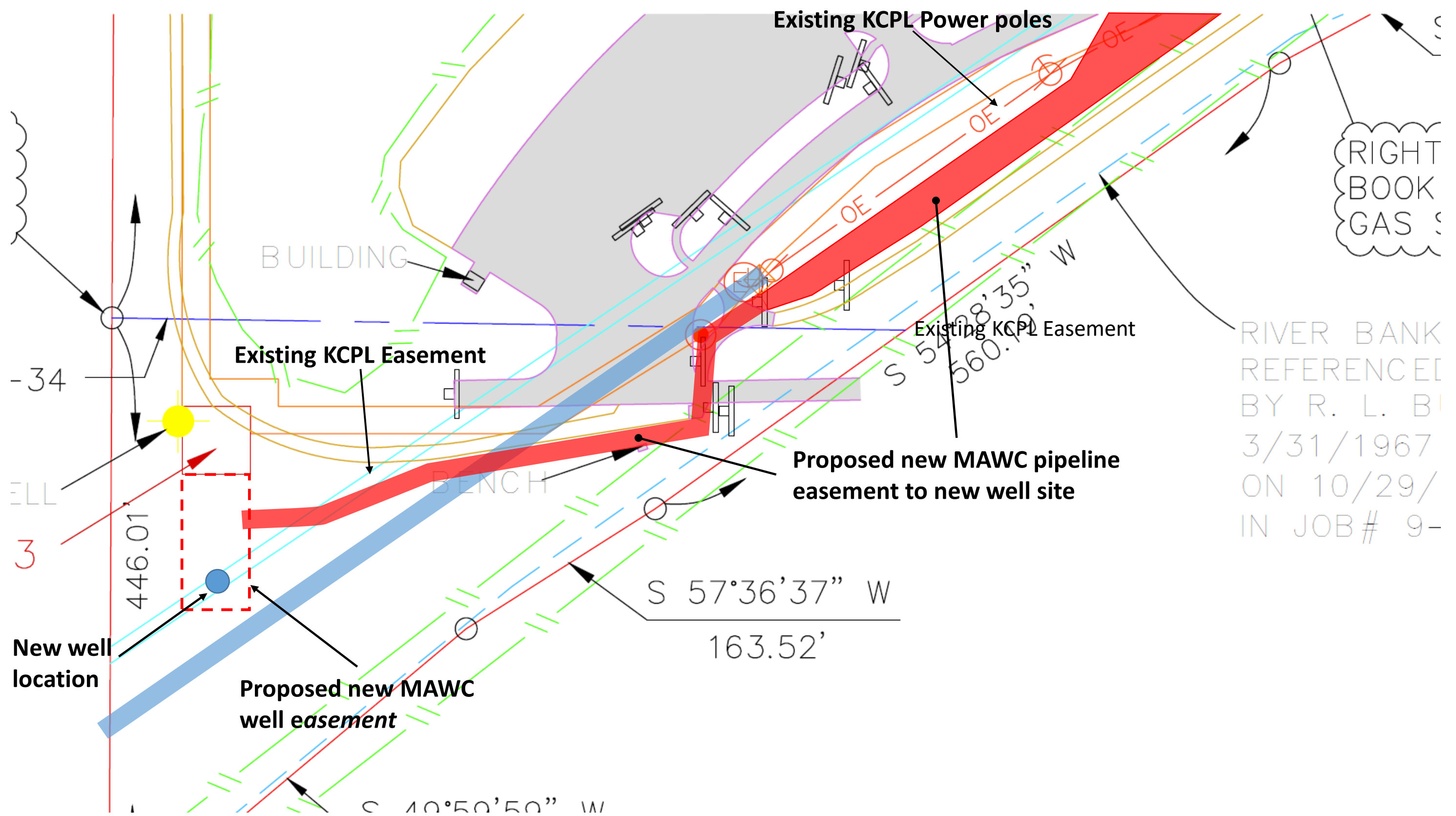

American Holly Trees are possibly one of the easiest trees to grow. Here in Maryland the woods are filled with American Holly Trees. In the winter the understory of the forests are alive with the green leaves and red berries that the birds just adore. American Water Wells

Black haw Viburnum- an exceptional plant but a VERY slow grower. Takes up to five years to get to over three feet in height. Easily maintained, it does need to be cut back every fall to maintain shape. In spring Black Haw produces very showy white flowers, similar to the non-native very invasive Bradford Pear but without the scent of a Bradford Pear. In fall the leaves turn bright red and are very attractive. This tree produces a black seed/fruit which is readily consumed by song birds. Only slightly drought tolerant so Black haw should be supplemental watered during drought.

American Hornbeam (musclewood) - small sized tree, prefers deep, fertile, moist, acidic soils and grows best in partial shade. This tree is primarily an understory tree although it can grow in full sun but will need supplemental watering during warm- hot weather and especially during drought as this tree is not drought tolerant. The seeds produced are excellent food sources for song birds. This tree however is heavily used by both deer and beavers so extra precaution should be taken in order to protect these trees from damage.

American Holly- This tree/shrub should absolutely not be used anywhere that is public land. This tree requires constant maintenance and has sharp leaves, which if in a park can be less than ideal especially with children around. American Holly also produces attractive berries that are toxic to humans if ingested. Holly trees do not do well in windy areas and need shelter from wind. If the tree is used, it can be trimmed to maintain an attractive hedge, but again will take a lot of time to get it there. The benefit of the American Holly is that it is a deciduous tree and it is both flood and drought tolerant. The main concern here is the manpower it will take to maintain this tree/shrub. Ideally if this tree is planted for the attractiveness of its berries it should be planted in groups of four rather than three in order to get appropriate cross pollination. Some potential replacements for the American Holly are, non-native Arborvitae which will still need maintenance but very little. Oak Leaf Hydrangea can be an excellent North American alternative, it is drought tolerant and can grow in shady areas as well as sunnier spots. It needs trimmed only once a year. It will grow tall but will take a good two years to get height. These Hydrangeas have beautiful triangular large white flowers all summer long. Native options could be: Indigo bush, button bush, or even Spicebush. Spice bush is a bit more hard to come by as it is a very sought after shrub, it is the larval host for the Spicebush Swallowtail (butterfly) and it prefers shady areas. Button Bush needs a lot of water but has stunning blooms. It does well in full sun and can thrive with at least six hours of sunlight. Pollinators love Button Bush. I have two of these in my yard and have not had to do any maintenance to them in two years. In a public area they should be trimmed back in the winter to give a more formal look to them.

Vernal Witch Hazel- This tree is great as it is native to the area and resistant to a lot of diseases and drought. Even being drought tolerant, it needs consistent moisture, its leaves can be scorched from hot summers. Witch Hazel spreads by root suckers so this will be a maintenance concern as they will need to be pruned to prevent unwanted spread of this tree. Vernal Witch Hazel is primarily an Ozark native growing in glade areas so it does not do well with flooding. Vernal Witch Hazel is subject to damage from Japanese beetles in the summer. Since the trees flower in the winter it adds a bit of beauty in winter months and is an excellent food source for early pollinators. An acceptable substitute for Vernal Witch Hazel could be American Witch Hazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*), still prefers understory to full sun but is more flood resistant than Vernal WH.

ISSUE:

Review Pocket Park Design Concepts

BACKGROUND:

In August 2014, the Board of Aldermen adopted Vision Downtown Parkville, a plan that included several improvements to downtown, including Pocket Park and the intersection of 1st and Main streets.

On October 3, 2017, the Board of Aldermen approved a professional services agreement with BBN Architects who was selected because of their extensive experience with downtown revitalization projects. On April 28, 2020, the City Administrator approved Work Authorization No. 5A for the research and preliminary sketches of Pocket Park. On June 16, 2020, the Board of Aldermen approved Work Authorization No. 5B with BBN Architects for the public engagement and preliminary design of Pocket Park.

The City formed a stakeholder committee comprised of downtown business owners adjacent to Pocket Park, Main Street Parkville Association (MSPA), Parkville Old Towne Market Community Improvement District (POTMCID) representatives, and elected officials. The stakeholder committee met at the end of June to review the opportunities and challenges associated with the Pocket Park area. The stakeholders were encouraged to provide feedback associated with their future vision of the area.

Based on the feedback received in the first stakeholder meeting, BBN Architects developed two distinct options to improve the Pocket Park area. These options were presented to the stakeholder committee at the end of July.

A work session was held in August with members of the Board of Aldermen and the Community Land and Recreation Board. Based on the feedback received from the work session, along with the feedback from the stakeholder committee, BBN Architects will finalize the design concept for the preferred option.

The finalized options for the Pocket Park Master Plan were developed and released to the public for a 30-day review period. A public forum was held in October with members from the MSPA and POTMCID. The final version of the master plan will be presented at the Board of Aldermen meeting

on December 1st.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The 2020 Parks Sales Tax Capital Outlay includes \$25,000 for the Pocket Park Master Plan. The total cost for Work Authorization Nos. 5A and 5B is \$24,636.

ALTERNATIVES:

1. Review the final master plan concepts.
2. Postpone this item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff is seeking feedback from CLARB members regarding the final master plan concepts.

POLICY:

Parkville Municipal Code Section 150.050(A) directs CLARB to act in an advisory capacity to the Board of Aldermen to develop and administer a writer plan for the care, preservation, pruning, planting, replanting, and removal or disposition of trees and shrubs along streets and in other public areas. As CLARB serves in an advisory capacity, its recommendations must be approved by the Board of Aldermen.

SUGGESTED MOTION:

I move to recommend that the Board of Aldermen adopt the Pocket Park Master Plan.

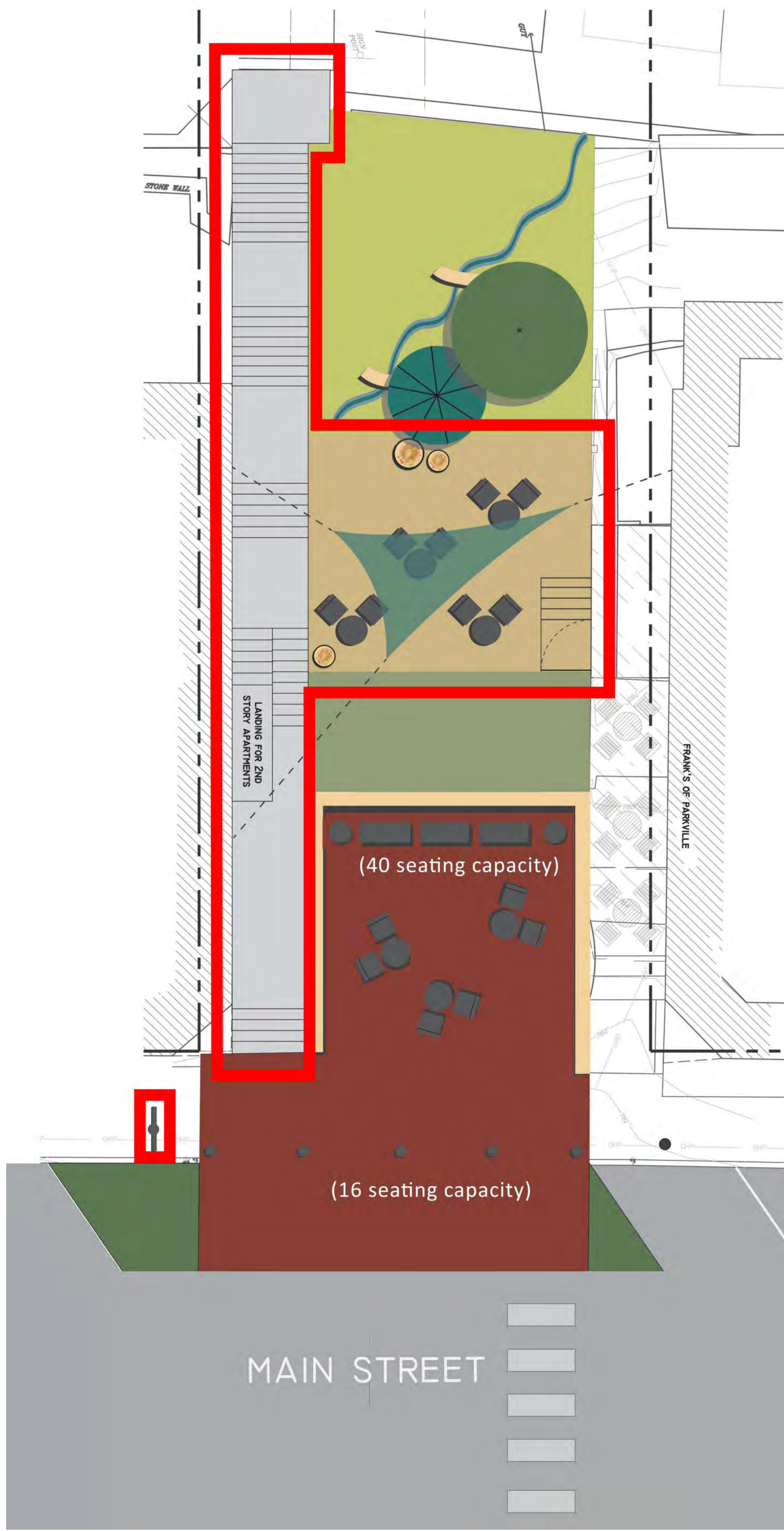

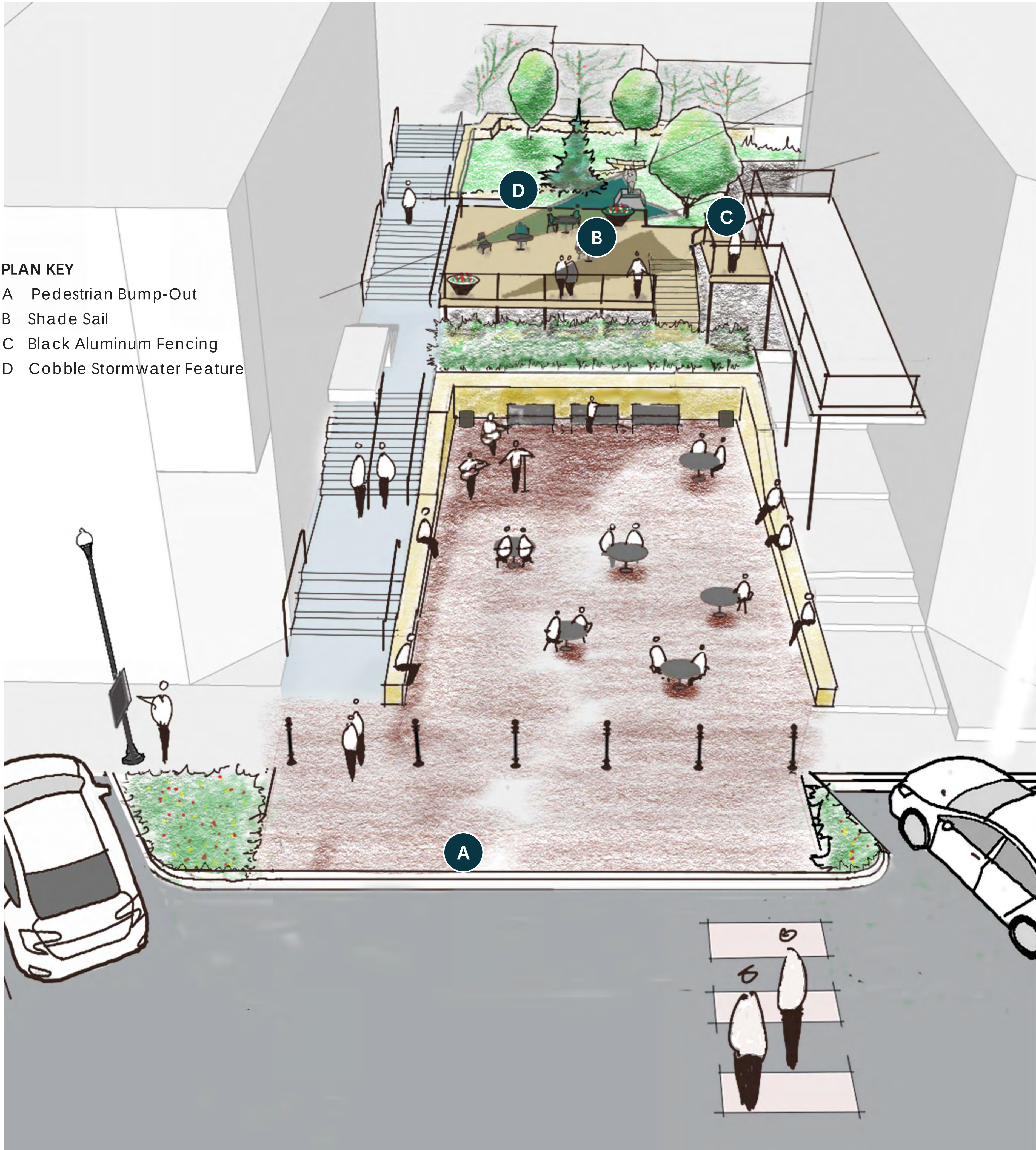

ISSUE:

Approval of Platte County Outreach Grant application items

BACKGROUND:

In 2009, the voters of Platte County approved a 10-year, half-cent sales tax for parks, recreation, and stormwater control. A portion of the sales tax proceeds are allocated for the Outreach Grant Program to promote the development of local parks, recreation facilities, and programs. Approximately \$250,000 is available each year through this program. In 2020, the voters of Platte County approved the sales tax renewal, supporting parks at a quarter-cent sales tax.

The Platte County Commission developed the Outreach Grant Program to promote the development of local parks, recreation facilities, and programs to enhance the quality of life for all residents. The program strengthens partnerships between the County, local governments, and non-profit organizations to strategically meet our common goals. Applicants must be a local government, school district, or other public subdivision of the State of Missouri.

Groups who are awarded grants can use the funds for a number of purposes related to parks and recreation. Eligible projects include, but are not limited to, the development or improvement of recreational facilities such as playgrounds, ball fields, and trails.

During the October meeting, the Community Land and Recreation Board (CLARB) discussed potential candidates for the 2021 Outreach Grant application. Watkins Park was discussed at great length. With the new master plan, which was recently adopted by the Board of Aldermen, the neighborhood park would be a great candidate for the grant. Instead of providing several options for the County to choose from, with the City typically only receiving one project each year, we have decided to only apply for one single grant in 2021.

Following the meeting, staff met to discuss potential upgrades that could be added to Watkins Park as part of this grant application. Phase 1 of the Watkins Park Master Plan includes the installation of a parking area, relocation of the existing shelter building and chat trail. With the grant application, we could upgrade the plan to include a new shelter building. The grant could be expanded to include upgrades to the English Landing Park playground, with the existing ELP Playground equipment being repurposed for Watkins Park.

BUDGET IMPACT:

Staff is currently finalizing the proposal for the 2021 budget. Each year, the City programs funding for Parks projects.

ALTERNATIVES:

1. Provide feedback to staff regarding the Outreach Grant applications.
2. Postpone this item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City submit an outreach grant application for one of the projects listed in the 2021 Capital Outlay program. Watkins Park improvements or playground upgrades might give us the best chance for funding.

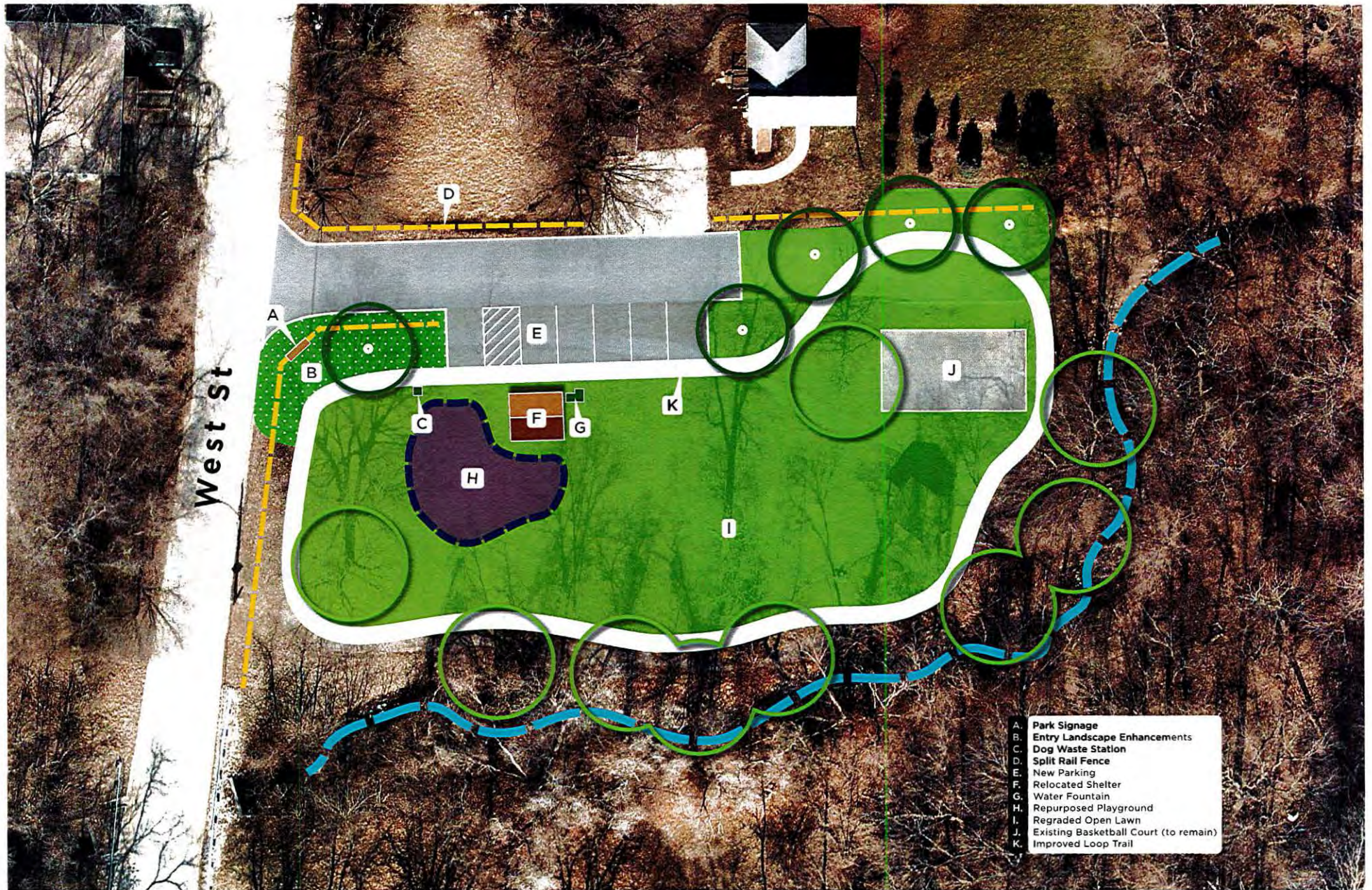

RE: October 2020 Parks Activity Report

The following Parks-related activities took place during October 2020:

- Spirit Fountain: The fountain was drained and cleaned. The pump was pulled for the winter season and the fountain winterized. Staff found two lights that need to be replaced, that will be done in the Spring before the fountain is back in service.
- Bench Repair: The broken concrete pad was formed and bench remounted.
- Fall Cleanup Assistance: The Parks crew assisted with the City's Fall Cleanup Event and Curbside Pickup.
- Tree Maintenance: Staff ground 20 stumps in various areas at the Train Depot, and in English Landing and Platte Landing Parks. Trees are watered as necessary during dry spells.
- Tree Planting: There were four Bald Cypress trees planted along the riverfront by Grigsby Field.
- Pickleball Construction: Gravel material was ordered and delivered for the pickleball and basketball court areas.
- Storm Restoration: Tree branches were picked up following heavy storms.
- Truck Maintenance: The Parks crews assist with Emergency Snow Operations during the winter months. Their trucks were winterized and serviced. The plow blades and salt spreaders were installed.
- Dumpster Maintenance: The dumpster bin storage area was cleaned and washed out.
- Grigsby Scoreboard: The restoration effort on the Grigsby Scoreboard is complete. The new processors were updated and LED lights replaced.
- Neighborhood Parks: Dog waste stations were installed in Adams and Watkins Parks.
- Watkins Park Maintenance: The old 4-seater swing was removed. The swing set was painted and the hooks replaced.
- Waddell Bridge Lighting: In preparation of the bridge lighting project, staff has been working to receive quotes from electrical contractors for the relocation of the existing light poles, which provide the power source for the bridge lighting.

- Ballfield Maintenance: The backstop board for Ballfield #3 was replaced.
- PLP Restroom Maintenance: The vault in the PLP restroom was pumped.
- Ballfield Maintenance: The ballfields were groomed three times per week. Grass and weeds were removed from the infields of Ballfields 1 and 3.
- Sanitizing: The playground and restrooms are sprayed daily.
- Mowing: The right-of-way along Hwy 45 was mowed weekly. The small parks were mowed weekly. The area around the PAC was mowed three times in September. The one-way split on Main Street was mowed. Areas in ELP, PLP, dog park, and Hwy 9 entryway sign were mowed. The riparian area in Platte Landing Park was mowed two times in September.
- Dog Stations: The bags were restocked at the dog stations throughout the park.
- Trail Maintenance: Trail maintenance was performed in various areas along the trail as washouts occur.
- Event Setup: Parks staff prepared the City parking lot and provided traffic control cones for Cruise Nights.

The following Parks-related activities took place during November 2020:

- Dog Park Gate: The latch on the Dog Park Gate was broken and was repaired.
- Mist Station / Drinking Fountain: The Misting Station / Drinking Fountain was overhauled, parts replaced and installed at the Volleyball Courts.
- Sand Volleyball Courts: The Volleyball sand was groomed.
- Pocket Park Maintenance: Following the accident in Pocket Park, staff cleaned up debris/auto parts, and cleaning the area.
- Watkins Park: Staff repaired an eroded area in the creek near the trail in Watkins Park.
- Storm Drain in Parking Lot: The storm drain in the Aloe Creek parking lot was cleaned.
- Spirit Fountain Maintenance: The ornamental grasses around the Spirit Fountain was cut and removed.
- Picnic Table Maintenance: Lumber was purchased to replace boards on picnic tables.
- Dog Park Maintenance: Approximately 50 truck loads of silt was removed from the entrance to the Large Dog Park. .
- Pickleball Courts: The concrete for the Pickleball Courts were formed and poured. The fence was installed in conjunction with the court installation.
- PLP Ballfield Grading: The grading contractor continues to spread the dirt in the area of the proposed ballfields in Platte Landing Park.
- Waterline Winterizing: The waterlines in the park were winterized.
- ELP Restroom: The heaters in the ELP Restroom were turned on for the winter.
- Sanitizing: The playground and restrooms are sprayed daily.

Eagle Scouts Below is the information from last report, I have Kade Tholen coming out for his project on November 7th and James on November 21st and if that day has bad weather he will reschedule to the 29th.

Two new scouts will be doing their projects at PNS, Kade Tholen and James Heckman. Kade will be doing an erosion control based project where Old Kate meets White Tail Trail, this will be the compliment to Prabhav Pagadala's project, and he will also be doing a compliment project to where Aidan Colligan did his Scout project. On top of both of these locations he will also be doing a culvert repair and installing rail road ties around two wash off areas on the old Kate Trail, his father owns a construction company so they will need very little assistance from me.

James project is to revitalize the Paw Paw Path, he is coordinating with both Urban Tree and Park University in order to use their parking lot for his project and to get mulch dumped so that he can widen the trail and re-mulch it in its entirety. He is interested in conservation so I taught him the basics of removing invasive Bush Honeysuckle and his troop will be removing all the Honeysuckle along the Paw Paw Path as well as rebuilding the trail.

Both projects will begin in November.

Parks/ Wetlands

The wetland project was “accepted with deficiencies” by the Corps of Engineers following a pre-final inspection performed on October 16th. A meeting was held on Thursday, October 29th between the Corps and the City of Parkville to discuss the maintenance on the wetlands and to discuss the City’s concerns about the project acceptance. There are several outstanding issues that still need to be addressed. During the meeting, the Corps stated that there is a 1-year warranty period and a 2-year maintenance period. During that time, the project will remain open so that the Corps can assess the issues and determine the best measures to remedy the issues and provide the project as promised. They assured the City that they will not give final acceptance of the project until the deficiencies have been addressed.

I have been continuously taking pictures and documenting my findings at least once a week.

National Disaster Relief Grant has been accepted in order to help with beautification efforts.

We have requested assistance for five locations in both English Landing and Platte Landing Park. With the help of Tom Barnard from parks I was able to calculate the labor hours required to complete all the projects.

We will start doing a soft interview for this grant. This grant takes displaced workers who have lost their jobs due to COVID and pays them for the labor that they provide The City of Parkville. Our first step in the interview process will be to introduce each candidate to the sites of interest.

I am taking over the butterfly garden/ pollinator habitat along highway 45. Starting the first week of November my two interns and I will be out there weeding it and looking into potentially getting signage for trail users so that they may have information on said garden.

Parkville Nature Sanctuary

Trail maintenance Honeysuckle removal and tree plantings are my main focus in the fall/ winter months. To date with the help of volunteers, Wayne, and our two interns we have cleared over two acres of invasive Bush Honeysuckle. On top of Honeysuckle removal we have been installing native trees and shrubs in its place so as to prevent the Honeysuckle from returning. On November 5th I hosted a volunteer work day with Heartland Tree Alliance. Heartland Tree Alliance provided close to fifty trees free of charge. With HTAs volunteers and PNS volunteers we were able to get all tree in the ground and watered.

Eagle Scouts On November 7th Kade Tholen, with the help of scouts from Troop 261, completed his Eagle Scout project in the Parkville Nature Sanctuary. He and his Troop did work in two different locations helping us immensely with both storm water control and erosion control of the trails. The first work completed was done around the Northern intersection of White Tail and Old Kate Trails. The rocky portion of White Tail allows water to come rushing down with little to no obstacles to slow it down, this allows the water to run rapidly taking gravel and debris with it causing wash out of the trail. This consistently heavy runoff had created a highly eroded rill following several large summer rain events. Along the southern spur of White Tail Trail is a large culvert, also with damage to it, that with erosion of the gravel trails has become filled with aggregate due to both storm water and over use of the trails.

Kade and his troop installed seven railroad ties across the slope of Old Kate Trail in order to greatly slow the moving water and to keep gravel held in place. These railroad ties will create barriers to slow down the water and collect debris. This action will keep gravel where it belongs and prevent trail washout. Kade and his troop added more gravel to the previously washed out section of the trail and packed it using a plate compactor.

The work that Troop 261 did along White Tail Trail began with repair to both sides of our damaged culvert using concrete and wire. The troop then installed several railroad ties along the edges of the trail to prevent any more trail erosion and gravel washout into our streams. They lined the railroad ties with large native stone found in the dry creek bed. The stones, along with rebar staking of ties will support them to ensure that the improvements to the trail last in perpetuity.

James Heckman completed his project November 22nd. James had twenty five volunteers assist him with his efforts. His Scout project completely revitalized the Paw Paw Path, the trail of PNS that runs behind the track at Park University. James, with the help of his troop removed invasive Bush Honeysuckle and invasive English Privet along the entirety of the trail. He and his father dropped a medium sized, non-native tree that was growing in the center of the trail. After removing the invasive species, which were choking out the trail, and dropping the tree blocking access to part of the trail they mulched and expanded the width of the trail. They mulched the entirety of the trail and hauled off the brush from the

removal of invasive Bush Honeysuckle and English Privet. His efforts to practice conservation (invasive species removal) will allow Paw Paw path to flourish in the coming years by allowing the native vegetation a change to thrive without competing for space and resources with invasive species.

In the long run this will help not only our trail system but it will provide greater wildlife habitat and food source. Removing invasive species and replacing them with native plants will greatly improve the water quality of our surrounding streams by filtering out any potential harmful chemicals from runoff from surrounding neighborhoods/ streets/ facilities nearby.

Sullivan's Nature Sanctuary Sullivan's trail system has been demolished in the installation of buried pipes. This was a great advantage as the trails were overgrown with Poison Ivy and starting to deteriorate. With the help of my interns we have begun rebuilding the trails and working of beautification efforts for Sullivan's. The work we have been doing includes removing invasive/noxious trees and using the logs to line the newly mulched and expanded trails. We have replanted native trees and by spring the entire trail system should be complete and filled in with native trees, shrubs, and flowering plants. I intend to keep SNS as a natural area that accommodates visitors with nicer trails, improvements to the overlook and adding seating.

Projects/ Programs As Trek with Santa was canceled due to COVID I decided that I couldn't leave the kids and visitors of PNS with nothing. In Trek with Santa's place I implemented "Letters to Santa" in which I built and decorated a 'mailbox to Santa' for which visitors can drop letters off the be mailed to the North Pole for Santa to read. Along with the box are sheets of paper with space to write a letter and instructions on where to drop the letter, I included a return address space on the sheets so that I can write return letters from 'Santa'. This is an engaging way for visitors to safely celebrate the holidays and to remember PNS as a place they can cherish and enjoy.

A Veterans Day Appreciation tradition was started this month. On Veterans Day I provided space, donuts and coffee for all veterans and their friends and family to enjoy time together outside. I reached out to The American Legion and the VA and VFW to inform them of the event. Bringing in neighboring organizations and communities to celebrate together is a vital way for PNS to remain relevant and for the public to have a sense of ownership of the sanctuary. Alan Shanks provided a bracket and American Flag which were hung at the main entrance of PNS. I got many hugs and thank yous for putting on this event and look forward to doing it every year.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT
PROJECT UPDATE
OCTOBER 2020

PLP Wetlands – The City is working with the US Army Corps of Engineers on the construction of a Section 1135 Wetland Project in Platte Landing Park. The project includes the construction wetland areas and restoration of a riparian corridor. BKM Construction, along with their subcontractors Linaweaver and Natural States Landscaping, contracted with the Corps to construct this project. City staff has been involved as a local project sponsor for this project. Because of the project cost savings, the Corps increased the vegetated areas throughout the project. The contractor mobilized at the end of February and started construction. In October, the Corps of Engineers accepted the project with deficiencies. There are several issues that have been identified associated with the project. The Corps of Engineers will be working on solutions to remedy these issues.

STATUS – IN PROGRESS.

Dog Park Shade Structure – In 2019, the City received an Outreach Grant from Platte County to construct shade structures in each of the dog parks, based on the recommendation from CLARB. Shergain started on the construction of the shelter buildings in May, and completed the buildings in June. Additional work has been done including pouring of the concrete pad, backfilling of the concrete pad, and installation of picnic tables under the structure. Staff is currently looking into installing a shade screen on the side of the structures.

STATUS – COMPLETE.

2020 Outreach Grants – The applications for the 2020 Outreach grants were submitted at the end of January. The requests include: (1) installation of pickleball courts; (2) improvements to the Busch Drive traffic circle; (3) improvements to the A-Truss bridge. In April, staff received notice of award of only one of the project, the improvements to the A-Truss Bridge.

STATUS – COMPLETE.

A-Truss Bridge Improvements – The improvements to the A-Truss bridge include installation of outline lighting throughout the structure. Outdoor Lighting Perspectives is under contract to make the improvements. Staff is working with an electrical contractor to relocate a nearby power pole, which will serve as the power source for the lighting. It is anticipated that this work will be completed in late 2020.

STATUS – IN PROGRESS.

Royals Donation – In late 2019, the City received \$25,000 from the Royals Foundation for improvements to the existing baseball fields. The projects include dugouts at Ballfield #3, bullpen at Grigsby, and upgrades to the scoreboard at Grigsby. The work has been completed for the Dugout structures on Ballfield #3 and Bullpen at Grigsby Field. The work on the Grigsby scoreboard was completed in October. All of the work association with the donation is complete.

STATUS – COMPLETE.

Pickleball Courts – The 2020 budget includes funding for the design and construction of Pickleball Courts. The City released the bid documents in June. The bid document included the base bid for four courts and included two bid alternates for lighting and relocation of the basketball court. The location of the courts was approved by CLARB and the Board of Aldermen in July. Staff finalized the contract documents and received the required insurance. Staff has also been working directly with Jack Moorhead, an USAPA Ambassador and PPA Certified Coach/Pro. He has provided valuable input to staff. Staff has also contracted with McClure Engineering to assist with the layout of the courts and sidewalk connections to the courts. The existing basketball court has been removed and the new court was installed in October. Staff is finalizing the details for the Pickleball Courts, which will be ready to pour in November. Staff will engage a contractor to install the sidewalks for the courts in a separate contract.

Neighborhood Park Improvements – The 2020 budget includes funding for the improvements to the Adams and Watkins neighborhood parks. In early 2020, it was determined that a public involvement process was necessary to determine the best improvements that fit with the needs of the neighborhood. The City has engaged the services of Vireo to assist with the public engagement. The public engagement included targeting mailing, in-person open house and online survey. There were 69 responses to the online survey. Staff reviewed the responses to the survey with the consultant, using the feedback to make decisions on the concept designs. The concepts were presented during the August CLARB meeting. The revised concepts were presented during the November 3rd Board of Aldermen meeting. The master plans for the neighborhood parks were adopted.

This process will include discussions with a small committee of business owners and other stakeholders from the downtown area to determine the best use for Pocket Park and the necessary improvements in the short-term and long-term. There were two stakeholder meetings held to gather feedback about the Pocket Park area and review the preliminary design. A work session was held with members of CLARB and the Board of Aldermen to review the preliminary design. An open forum was held with the Main Street Parkville Association (MSPA) and Parkville Old Towne Marketplace Community Improvement District (POTMCID) to review the preliminary designs. An online survey was available to gather feedback from the community regarding the amenities shown in the two concepts. The concepts will be reviewed during the November CLARB meeting. A public forum was held with MSPA, POTMCID, and the stakeholders. The 30-day review period started in mid-October. The proposed plans will be presented during the December 1st Board of Aldermen meeting for approval.

Riverfront Park Entry Signage – The 2020 budget includes funding for the design of entry signage for the two riverfront parks. Vireo was hired to design concepts for approval. Future budget cycles will include the installation of these signs. A small committee consisting of representatives from the Board of Aldermen, CLARB and staff met to discuss the vision for the signage. Based on this feedback, Vireo will develop concepts for consideration by the committee. The Board of Aldermen approved a work authorization for the additional wayfinder signs and style guide for companion signs in the park. The naming convention was discussed at a Board of Aldermen meeting as a non-action item. Since there was no clear recommendation from the board, no action could be taken on the name of Platte Landing Park. Staff received direction from the board to keep the naming of the parks in their current form. A meeting was held in October to review concepts for the riverfront signage. It is anticipated that the concepts will be ready for review in the December CLARB meeting. The proposed concepts will be presented to the Board of Aldermen in early 2021.

PLP Wetlands – The City is working with the US Army Corps of Engineers on the construction of a Section 1135 Wetland Project in Platte Landing Park. The project includes the construction wetland areas and restoration of a riparian corridor. BKM Construction, along with their subcontractors Linaweaver and Natural States Landscaping, contracted with the Corps to construct this project. City staff has been involved as a local project sponsor for this project. Because of the project cost savings, the Corps increased the vegetated areas throughout the project. The contractor mobilized at the end of February and started construction. In October, the Corps of Engineers accepted the project with deficiencies. There are several issues that have been identified associated with the project. The Corps of Engineers will be working on solutions to remedy these issues.

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STATUS – IN PROGRESS.

Royals Donation – In late 2019, the City received \$25,000 from the Royals Foundation for improvements to the existing baseball fields. The projects include dugouts at Ballfield #3, bullpen at Grigsby, and upgrades to the scoreboard at Grigsby. The work has been completed for the Dugout structures on Ballfield #3 and Bullpen at Grigsby Field. The work on the Grigsby scoreboard was completed in October. All of the work association with the donation is complete.

STATUS – COMPLETE.

Pickleball Courts – The 2020 budget includes funding for the design and construction of Pickleball Courts. The City released the bid documents in June. The bid document included the base bid for four courts and included two bid alternates for lighting and relocation of the basketball court. The location of the courts was approved by CLARB and the Board of Aldermen in July. Staff finalized the contract documents and received the required insurance. Staff has also been working directly with Jack Moorhead, an USAPA Ambassador and PPA Certified Coach/Pro. He has provided valuable input to staff. Staff has also contracted with McClure Engineering to assist with the layout of the courts and sidewalk connections to the courts. The existing basketball court has been removed and the new court was installed in October. The Pickleball Court was installed in November, in conjunction with the perimeter fencing. Temporary painting will be added to the Basketball and Pickleball courts until Spring 2021 when the courts can be painted properly. Staff will engage a contractor to install the sidewalks for the courts in a separate contract. Hopefully the sidewalks can be paved if there are mild temperatures this winter.
